

Fellow Lions and Community Supporters,

The Lions Charity Foundation of Southeastern Virginia, Inc., supports the 95 Lions Clubs of District 24-I located throughout central and southeastern Virginia. The Foundation operates using contributions, interest on investments and net proceeds from our fundraising event, the Bid 'N Buy Auction.

The Board of Directors has been very busy this Lions year. I'd like to share with you some of the activities funded by the foundation in 2018 – 2019:

\$17,515	<u>Lions Diabetes Family Camp</u> is a unique retreat for diabetic children, ages 6 to 18, and their families. The goals of the weekend include: to learn more about diabetes self-care management, share experiences with other families and enjoy adventurous physical activities. In April 2019 Lions hosted 48 families.
\$10,000	Barrier Islands Center for My First Field Trip Educational Program is designed to teach children ages four and five about the Barrier Islands history, art, music and manners.
\$5,570	Virginia Beach Public School Division's <u>Beach Bag Program</u> providing food over the weekends and school breaks for children identified by the school division as food insecure.
\$4,000	Holiday House of Portsmouth, Inc., a non-profit organization committed to improving the quality of lives of youth with intellectual disabilities.
\$2,840	Donations to the <u>Food Banks</u> of Southeastern Virginia, Peninsula and the Northern Neck region
\$2,800	Boy Scout Post 180 at the Sara Bonwell Hudgens Center. This is the largest Post in the USA for individuals with intellectual disabilities.

The foundation continues our commitment to programs designed to prevent blindness, restore eyesight and improve eye health for residents of Central and Southeastern Virginia. Lions also work to restore hearing by providing services or equipment to individuals in financial need.

\$28,700	<u>Value of services</u> provided by our medical services partners for two prosthetic eyes and five
	cataract surgeries for individuals suffering from vision loss.

Purchase of <u>four Spot devices</u> to perform eye screenings to detect vision problems in children as young as six months old. Lions are screening children ages six and younger to detect the need for eyeglasses or a disorder commonly called "lazy eye." If lazy eye is caught and treated early, it can prevent blindness in that eye. Total of **19,067 kids** between the ages of 6 months and 10 years were screened with **2332 being referred** for further evaluation. In



addition, **3339 individuals** of ages outside the above parameters were screened with **580 being referred**.

\$17,550 Twenty-six hearing aids provided to individuals suffering from hearing loss.

\$11,700 Provided <u>eyeglasses and exams</u> for indigent individuals at various Lions screenings conducted at the Union Mission, Richmond County and Homeless Connect projects in the cities of Hampton, Norfolk and Virginia Beach.

The grants listed above combined with various smaller grants allowed the foundation to distribute \$103,550 this year. I'm pleased to report this brings our overall contributions to \$930,000 since 2010. As you can see the work of the Lions Charity Foundation of southeastern Virginia is essential to both the Lions Clubs of District 24-I and the individuals we serve. This is why I hope you will continue your generous support of the foundation and the Bid 'N Buy Auction.

Finally, I'd like to thank our donors, Lions and our Board of Directors for their generosity and tireless efforts to support the Lions Charity Foundation of Southeastern Virginia.
